Many countries have deregulated health care and have placed caps on the amount that can be charged for individual services. In the United Kingdom, a capitated plan was introduced in 1994 and by 1996 approximately 70% of the population were covered. This paper reviews the impact of the introduction of managed care capitation in the UK and assesses its economic implications. The capitation fee can be viewed as a combination of a budgetary contribution and a profit-making component. The budget cap is fixed and is a cost saving device. It has the advantage of a predictable savings which can offset any price increases associated with the introduction of the capitated plan. The profit cap is a variable amount and is set at a level which will allow the providers to make a reasonable profit. However, it is the high profit cap which has been criticized because the majority of the savings are in the budget portion and the incremental savings in the profit portion are used to expand the service provision rather than to reduce prices. In the long-run, it would seem that the balance of the profit cap is likely to be less than the average profit level in the new system. For a provider that makes a higher profit margin in the conventional fee-for-service environment, the introduction of managed care would be an appropriate mechanism to reduce costs. The reduction in the profit cap is likely to be more of a problem than the budget cap for those providers who are capable of higher-quality work.
